



SYNOPSIS

Pastor Arnold's church turned Bonnie's life around. In it, she found healing from her troubled past and met Micah Bailey, her future husband. Micah's dad Colin ran the church's soup kitchen, his mum Nora helped with the women's ministry, and his brother Nathaniel was studying at the church's college to be a missionary with his fiancé Meghan. For Bonnie, it all seemed too good to be real.

So when Pastor Arnold had an affair with Meghan and the two of them left the country, Bonnie's fairytale shattered. Bonnie and Micah now attend Colin's small house church, a reactionary group for people wounded by Arnold. They also help in Colin and Nora's new grassroots food bank. Nathaniel, heartbroken and disillusioned, abandoned his faith and turned to drugs.

With the Bailey's lives barely on a new equilibrium, Arnold has returned, seeking the family's forgiveness and opening a local homeless shelter for an interstate charity. Bonnie wants to pardon him but Colin refuses to accept that Arnold's contrition is genuine and sets out to expose Arnold as a fraud to his new employers. Micah initially supports his father and Bonnie finds herself caught between her love for the Baileys and her faith-based urge to forgive.



CHARACTERS

Bonnie (23)

Childhood for Bonnie felt like being trapped in a parental sparring match. When she met and fell in love with Micah, she couldn't believe that loving families like his existed. Startled by Colin's anger at Arnold's return, Bonnie begins to question the perceived perfection of her new life.

Micah (24)

Offered a temp job by one of the elders at Arnold's old church, Micah keeps it secret from his strong-willed father. His new boss's influence soon has Micah seeing Arnold with fresh eyes. For the first time in his life, Micah considers stepping out of Colin's shadow... and it terrifies him.

Colin (54)

When he found God in his 30s, Colin channelled his gift of fixing things into fixing broken people, but after the scandal, he watched his son Nathaniel spiral out of control and out of his life. Colin knew where to lay the blame – he won't allow Arnold to bring such pain to other families.

Arnold (32)

The son of a celebrity pastor, Arnold followed his father's footsteps into the pulpit of his own church. His bold vision and charisma led to spectacular growth, undone in a heartbeat when his moral failings were exposed. He lost his family and ministry but claims his time in the wilderness has deepened his faith. And so he's come back, saying that he wants to make restitution.







THE TEAM

A masters graduate of Melbourne Uni's filmmaking program, Luke has a passion for telling grounded, real-world stories with cinematic flair.

His award winning short films display a compassion for everyday people and nuanced execution. They have screened at Flickerfest, Gold Coast Film Festival, Adelaide Film Festival, and international fests like Manchester and In The Palace. Simon is the co-creator of 'Safe Harbour', an International Emmy winning TV series that put refugee issues in the context of a psychological thriller. It screened on BBC, Hulu, and SBS.

His latest credit was as one the writers on NITV's Logie winning feature documentary 'Incarceration Nation'. He also directs, produces, and stars in Songs with Simon, a YouTube channel of kids' songs that has 640 million views and 1.3 million subscribers.

Before becoming a screenwriter, he was a physiotherapist, managed and performed in a rock band, and had stints as a youth and worship pastor. He saw his fair share of brokenness and pain in all these roles but also saw many cases of healing and restoration. The stories he now tells tend to reflect life's complexities while exploring pathways to redemption and hope.
